8 of 9 Students in Your Problem Session Just Want to be Held

At the conclusion of a four-year study, College statistics major Maya D'Angelo has revealed that the vast majority of students in math and science courses who attend supplementary discussion or problem sessions do not do so with the intent of learning anything about the class. So what is it that motivates these students to trek through the snow to extra classes in the deep dark of Chicago after 5 p.m.?

According to D'Angelo's study, only six percent of students who attend discussion or problem sessions "actually understand what is happening in the class." Of these, 98% responded that "The opportunity to boost my self-esteem by being near people who are dumber than me" was a "very strong motivator for attending evening sections... In other words, there is almost always at least one That Kid present in an evening section solely to judge other students."

The paper went on to claim that the "vast majority of the remaining students responded that their primary motivator was 'the desperate desire for a shred of empathy.'" In the comments section, one student said, "a single drop of human kindness out of the vast, anonymous,

DEAN BOYER: "THIS WEEKEND" IS WEED WEEKEND"

Citing the stress of midterms and the "total need for some chillaxing," Dean John W. Boyer has declared a campuswide "weed weekend" beginning January 16th, 2014. Although the traditional weekend lasts from Saturday to Sunday, Boyer noted in a campus-wide email blast that extending the weed weekend to include Thursday, Friday, and the following Monday would really give students the chance to "bro out" and "just hang" for an additional three days. The Dean of the College and Martin A. BIRDS ELECT TO FREEZE RATHER THAN MIGRATE TO FLORIDA

This winter, America's migratory birds have chosen to try their luck with the freezing temperatures of the North rather than face the state of Florida.

New Evidence Suggests Odyssey may not be Historically Accurate

Yesterday, a report from the University of Chicago Institute for the Study of Ancient Greco-Roman History claimed to have found textual inconsistencies in Homer's telling of The Odyssey which may raise the question of the accuracy of his works. The Trojan War and the return of King Odysseus to Ithaca have long comprised an important adjunct to the modern study of Ancient Greek history, but recent discoveries have shed doubt on our knowledge of these events. Academics have relied on the texts of ancient historian Homer, whose tales of warfare and

one-eyed monsters have been hailed as one of the best sources on the life and travel of Odysseus.

"For example, we had long assumed that the monster Scylla was the Greek name for the modern White-Fronted Goose, but cross disciplinary dialogue with biologists at the National Technical institute of Athens has revealed that the White-Fronted Goose does not have six heads, nor does it, indeed, normally prey on humans. Furthermore, the story claims that Odysseus felled a Cyclops, when the fossil record suggests that Cyclops went extinct more than 3,000 years before the time of the Trojan War. We're embarrassed not to have

noticed some of these, in retrospect, quite glaring inconsistencies. Our Institute had planned a comprehensive analysis years ago, but stuff kept getting in the way, and then, of course, Jerry's kid had a thing."

The report cautioned against excessive panic in academia, maintaining that other great works of Greco-Roman history, including Herodotus' Histories, Livy's Ab Urbe Condita and Riordan's Percy Jackson and the Olympians, are still believed to be accurate accounts of Greek history.

BREAST CANCER BECOMES AWARE

After decades of painstaking medical research and ardent fundraising efforts, Breast Cancer finally became aware during a thunderstorm last Tuesday morning at 3:52 AM EST. Oriental Institute to be Renamed "Institute of Exotic Studies"

As part of a comprehensive program of modernization, the University of Chicago's Oriental Institute has adopted a title more suited to the post-modern era: "The University of Chicago Institute of Exotic Studies." Administration officials arrived at the name after many months of labored consultation. Already, the change is being celebrated by the university community and others as a dismissal of outdated colonial categorizations.

The Institute's original name, chosen during its establishment in 1919, has been attacked as a relic of a less informed time. "The word 'Oriental' has fallen out of favor," said James Johnson, Matthew L. Bowpatch Distinguished Service Professor of Alternative Medicine. "Back in the early 1900s, pioneering explorers often used arbitrary classifications such as 'oriental'

FROSTY THE SNOWMAN DEAD AT 37

Frosty the Snowman, beloved Children's icon and opiate addict, died in his Southern California home on Tuesday aged 37. While the cause of death is still under investigation, sources close to Mr. the Snowman report that he had been struggling with multiple drug addictions.


From his television debut in 1997 until his death, Snowman was cherished universally as a symbol of hope and a beacon of happiness. Even during his lifetime, the name Snowman was synonymous with winter weather, playfulness, and childhood glee.

Frosty the Snowman got his start on the Late Show with David Letterman. In January 1997, at only twenty years old, Snowman became one of the youngest comedians to perform on the show. From there, Snowman became a frequent guest, continuing to do standup in New York City until he landed his own television snow in 1999, Wake Up with Frosty! immensely popular children's program ran every weekday for three seasons on PBS. In 2001, however, rumors surfaced about a cocaine addiction – and, in March of 2002, Frosty! was cancelled. Although the show was officially pulled because of poor ratings, it was widely believed that the cancellation resulted from bad press

following multiple allegations of sexual harassment.

Though Snowman could still be found performing at clubs in the city, and would occasionally make an appearance on morning talk shows, his fame had largely dwindled. Many speculated Snowman was finished, and

it was even believed that he may have been checked in to a rehabilitation clinic for his widely rumored drug problems. Snowman reappeared



The Frosty Returns! tour, which would have taken Snowman to thirty-eight cities in over a dozen states, was cancelled three weeks prior to its start after a scandal involving the snowman was made public. Footage from the scandal, dubbed "Snowgate", which involved a raid by armed police officers on an upscale Beverly Hills home, aired July 27th, 2011 on national

news. The video footage depicted Snowman, half-naked, being handcuffed and dragged from a back room littered with needles and used prophylactics. Three female guests of Snowman's who were also arrested later came forward as prostitutes and admitted to being hired by Snowman

seized from the bust, including cocaine, heroin, extravagantly decorated drug paraphernalia seemed to confirm rumors of Snowman's addiction problems. A statement released by

the performer's agent stated that Snowman would seek professional help.

Following the scandal, Snowman stayed out of the public eve and refused all interview requests. Members of Snowman's family declined comment, except to say that he had always "had problems" but had "never meant any harm to anyone."

Snowman is survived by his wife, Laura, and two buttons.

After the official announcement, Monsanto welcomed to the stage Jenny Carlson, a member of a focus group for the new cereal. She remarked that the flakes had "a nice fishy flavor" and that the randomly-placed extraneous genes gave it "a

real kick. I didn't expect a single breakfast to be so abominably flavorful. The hair was a nice touch too." .Monsanto promptly ushered her outside. Jenny was unavailable for further comment.

"It's just good practice to have real people talk about your product," Chase said.

". It's a shame most companies refuse to admit whether or not they even use the products we've worked so hard to produce."

Asked whether the cereal boxes would bear any official markings indicating their GMO status, Chase activated a smoke bomb and fled the room, leaving "LAW-SUIT PENDING" burned into the floor.
